In this course, students will gain a general knowledge of integrated rural development and rural business performance. This course will cover all policies and analyze the factors that contribute to improving the economic and social well-being of the population in rural areas, we will focus on stakeholder analysis, management, planning, and policy-making in rural development.		
Course objectives:	The main purpose of this course is to offer students to gain a better understanding of the rural economy, its structure, importance, and the causes of rural backwardness. To analyze and understand the rural economy, natural resources, and also other rural industries. To examine the rural population and its labour force, problems and conditions of rural labour, and policy measure to improve their conditions. To explain rural unemployment, types of unemployment, and governmental policies. To analyze rural poverty and migration and their consequences on rural society.
